

Safeguarding Adults at Risk



Target Audience

Care and Support staff in a variety of settings and Housing Support Teams who are providing direct care and support.

This course has been developed for learners whose job role requires them to have contact with Adults at Risk within their own work setting, this may be face to face, virtual or on the phone. Risks of abuse and harm can be presented in a wide variety of ways and can change from place to place for every person being supported. This course will support learners to explore and acknowledge how to identify potential risks and how to ensure these are minimised.

This course is delivered using a range of methods and resources including:

• Face to Face tutor facilitation, questionnaires, scenarios for breakout groups, questioning and participation, video, current news articles, policies and procedures and end of session assessment.
