- ◆ Physical effects of a stroke
- ◆ The impact of a stroke on swallowing, nutrition and sensory abilities
- ◆ How effects of a stroke can fluctuate
- ◆ Daily activities to promote recovery and independence
- ◆ Psychological and emotional effects
- ◆ The influence of person centred values
- ◆ Partnership working
